

Why are Suicide Rates so High in Construction



- Male dominated industry
- Strength, determination, grit the same traits that can be a barrier to asking for help for mental health concerns
- Access to lethal means firearms, tall places, pills
- Chronic pain from hard, physical labor
- Higher rates of drug and alcohol abuse
- Shift work or non-traditional hours →sleep disruption→depression
- Financial stress; no work no pay, lack of paid sick leave
- Time away from families→relationship stress, lack of support
- Multi-employer work structure
- Competitive and high pressure work environment
- All can contribute to mental health issues in addition to biological mental health issues



Why Men are at Greater Risk



- Traditional male gender roles discourage emotional expression.
- Depression may be underdiagnosed in men.
- Men are less likely to seek help for emotional problems.
- Men may be more likely to self-treat symptoms of depression with alcohol and other substances.
- Men are also more likely to use lethal suicide methods.




Why it's Important to Address Mental Health




